
- Stone Age began when the first tools were made from stone and ended with the introduction of metal tools.
- At the end of the Ice Age, the sea levels rose and turned Britain into an island. Humans survived by using sharp stone tools to kill animals, such as mammoths.
- In the Stone Age, dead animals proved to be useful as they provided food, skins to keep warm and bones to make tools.
- Evidence of the Stone Age include discoveries of cave paintings, early tools and settlements.
- In early Stone Age, the Palaeolithic period, people were hunters and found food from roaming
 place to place. During Middle Stone Age, the Mesolithic time period, tools were developed, canoes
 meant that people also hunted for fish. In the late Stone Age, the Neolithic, life changed dramatically and people began to settle into farming villages, people also started to look after animals and
 grow crops.
- During the Bronze Age, stone was replaced by Bronze. Better farming equipment and weapons were produced. In the Iron Age, iron was used as the primary material. This period of history ended when the Romans invaded.
- During this time period, shelters and homes drastically developed from caves to huts, to homes with foundations, wood and wattle and daub. These development influenced periods of history
